Lynn Skaife recalls overhearing a conversation when he was about 12 years old that may give us a hint as to how the reunion got started. Lynn's father, Elmer Skaife, and Dr. Tom Livingston, "Doc", who was visiting from New Mexico, were sitting out on the porch at the Skaife farm. They were talking about how there should be a family picnic....

And sure enough a picnic was planned in 1923. Kathryn Rosemeyer remembers her mother, Eva Livingston Bailey, preparing it around the visit of her uncle, "Doc", and his wife, Lottie. (Early Days cont.) the ground. Invitation was informally by word of mouth. Everyone had such a good time it was agreed to have it again the next year. Vi Livingston recollects that she couldn't attend the first picnic because her one year old child had a bad case of the whooping cough.

From a simple picnic, the reunion evolved into a two-day affair complete with costumes, music, skits and dancing. A platform was built onto the bandstand; a piano was moved onto the stage. A woman unrelated to the family, Ann Hocking Smith, produced hometown plays and would come into town ahead of time to direct the program. Claude Watson was also involved in arranging the program. They were usually lucky to have good weather. The food was outstanding. Everyone looked forward to Vi Livingston's delicious apple pies.



Bess excelled in the family arts. She was devoted to her family, was an excellent cook, and kept a lovely home. Her letters revealed a literary talent. Although a reserved person, she readily

displayed a sense of humor. She was known for her generosity and compassion.

She met her husband, David, who was from Arkansas, when he had an occasion to stav at the Livingston Hotel. He took a liking to her and later sent her a crate of oranges. That apparently persuaded her to head south with her southern gentleman instead of attending the University of Wisconsin.




Nell 1887-1949

Nell shared some of her sister's traits of course. She too had a great sense of humor but more on the biting side. She tended to be more outgoing and gregarious and was known for telling a good story. While managing the Livingston Hotel, she was able to ply her writing skills as a stringer for the Fennimore, Lancaster, Madison and Platteville newspapers. During the Depression, she worked on the WPA Writer's Project researching materials on Frank Lloyd Wright's Taliesin East near Spring Green. She was also a tireless worker for the progressive LaFollette Party.

Bess and Nell are memorialized at the Rock Church Cemetery.



CHRISTMAS MORNING CRANBERRY MUFFINS

1 c. fresh cranberries, coarsely chopped

1/4 c. sugar

Sprinkle cranberries with sugar and set aside.

1 1/2 c. flour

1 tsp. salt

1/4 c. sugar

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

2 tsp. baking powder

1/4 tsp. allspice

1 egg

Mix dry ingredients together. Add egg.

1/4 tsp. grated orange peel

1/3 c. melted margarine

3/4 c. orange juice

1/4 c. chopped walnuts

Combine last four ingredients. Add liquid mixture to flour mixture. Add cranberries and nuts. Bake 375 for 15-20 min. Makes 1 dozen muffins or 4 dozen miniature muffins.


